Three GOP candidates battle to face incumbent Hackel for Macomb Co. exec

Three Republican candidates are vying for the chance to take on Macomb County Executive Mark Hackel in the November general election.

Two of the three, Randell J. Shafer and Erin A. Stahl, ran against Hackel and lost when the former sheriff was easily elected as the county's first executive four years ago. Hackel, 52, is unopposed in the Democratic primary.

Stahl, a former St. Clair Shores councilwoman, and Shafer, a retired Army chief warrant officer from St. Clair Shores, are joined in the Aug. 5 GOP primary by David J. Novak of Chesterfield Township, a program manager for an engineering company.

Novak and Stahl, while avoiding direct criticism of Hackel, say they would make some changes in how county <u>finances</u> are handled. Shafer did not respond to interview requests from The Detroit News.

Under Hackel, the county has eliminated a \$13.5 million deficit, partly by cutting 450 positions since 2011. Earlier this month, he presented a \$192.5 million general <u>fund</u> <u>a</u> budget for 2015 that calls for neither tax hikes nor layoffs.

The executive also has clashed at times with commissioners over budget issues and control of county contracts.

Asked how he would be different from Hackel, Novak, 47, answered in an email, "I have an ability to lead and work WITH elected officials and Department heads."

Novak, an Army veteran who ran for a state House seat in District 32 four years ago, said he wants to shrink government and make Macomb County more business-friendly.

"I want to help expand on the opportunities that Macomb can offer to the business owners otin and give them a reason to invest in Macomb," he said. "I would also like to help create an environment where employees can keep more of their hard earned income, by lessening the burden of an over bloated government intent on spending more and more and taxing more and more to pay for these bad habits."

Stahl, 44, said she would analyze the county's budget to find savings.

"I plan to design Macomb County government into the example for other communities of how to live with our means while strategically dumping our debt." she said.


